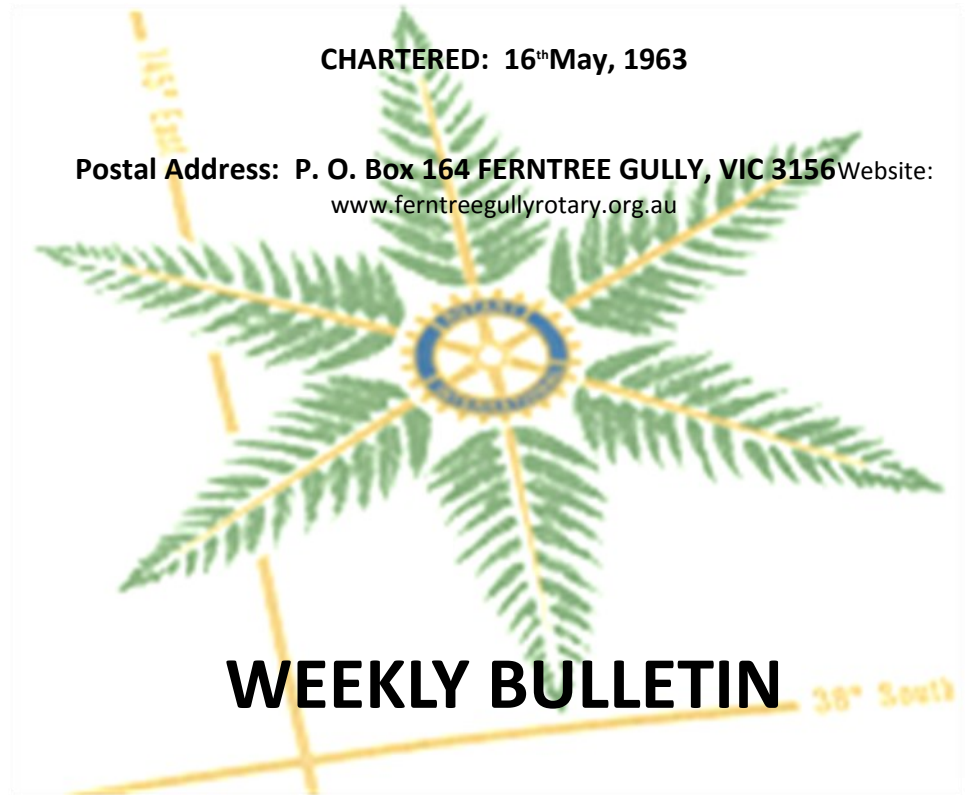

- Made mention of last week's speaker (Grayden Pilcher) who wanted to help the community—excellent presentation.

Other - Bob Prosser

- Spoke on the Rotary Youth Exchange Program, relating a story about a girl living in isolation in northern Australia who met up with inbound exchange students who passed through the tiny township where she was living. The students were on Safari. She subsequently has been accepted for exchange next year with various clubs sponsoring her financially. This is the time of thing that motivates Rotarians across the world. It's what the Rotary Youth Exchange Program is all about.

Sergeant-at-Arms - Fran Mandergeddes

- Fran extracted money from various football supporters, upsetting the Collingwood supporters. She then moved on to Logie questions (where the correct answer was no defence.) Moving on to general knowledge—there was much jocularly.

- Introduced herself (in German) and then, reverting to English, told us a little about herself and her family, why she wanted to be an exchange student and that she would be departing for Austria in January 2014.

- Told us she was from Bel Horizonte, Brasil. She gave a Powerpoint presentation giving various statistics on Brasil and later, photographs of her family.

Barbara told us how she came to apply for youth exchange. At a Rotary meeting she heard past exchange student Isabella Zatti describing her time in Australia with RC FTG and was inspired with the enthusiasm to request Australia as her destination country.

President Phil then invited **President Tim** to take the floor. President Tim took great pleasure in presenting Deputy Chairman of the District YEP Committee, Bob Prosser, with a Sapphire to add to his PHF. This was awarded for his efforts and contribution to Youth Exchange over many years. A very well deserved award. Well done Bob!!

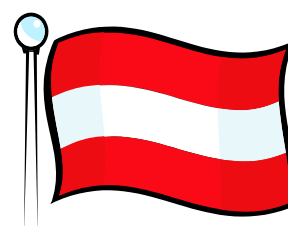
PROGRAM: KNOX MATTERS - Karin Orpen, Mayor of Knox

- Karin told us of her history of standing up for, and fighting for, right and justice. Currently the fight on her hands is to stop high rise development in FTG village.
- Talked of long ago issues surrounding the local CFA tin rattle which was to be stopped due to regulations. This was when she approached Rotary to help.
- Told how Knox Council was once a part of the shire of Fern Tree Gully. One of only two councils to become a city. 2013 is the City of Knox's 50th Anniversary and has produced a new logo to commemorate it.
- With a budget of \$140 million and 150,000 budgeting is a big job.
- Knox has one of the highest rates of domestic violence in the whole of Melbourne. Working with Yarra Ranges a government grant has been give to help address the problem.
- There is a campaign (25th November) - *White Ribbon Day*. To promote the elimination of violence against women.

There being no further business Pres Phil thanked Karin Orpen, congratulated Bob Prosser, thanked Pres Tim and other Bayswater members, and all other guests for attending. He then read out the housekeeping duties for next week and made mention of the upcoming fellowship morning on 22nd encouraging all to attend in their Rotary uniform.

Rotary's commitment to Service Above Self is channelled through five Avenues of Service, which form the foundation of club activity.

Community Service focuses on change starting with our local community. Activities that our clubs undertake to improve life in their community include Bovealecan, SecondStep, Air Rescue, Emergency Medical Information Basesets, and rebuilding flood and/or fire affected communities. Community Service also includes Australian Rotary Health, a registered charitable organisation that supports health research projects and research scholarships in Australia.

Youth Service recognises the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service projects, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding. Programs include Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEP), Rotary Youth Exchange, the National Youth Science Forum, the Science and Engineering Challenge, Model United Nations Assembly, and youth driver awareness.

Club Service focuses on strengthening fellowship and ensuring the effective functioning of the club.

Vocational Service encourages Rotarians to serve others through their vocations and to practice high ethical standards. Visiting local businesses to learn about industry in our community increases our knowledge and helps to build our networks. Projects around learning a trade and awards for pride in workmanship are just some of the programs in which Rotarians promote high ethical conduct in business and professions.

International Service expands Rotary's humanitarian reach around the globe and promotes world understanding and peace. Rotary clubs can sponsor projects in another country, seek international partners to support projects in their own communities, or Rotarians can personally volunteer at an international project site. Projects include polio eradication, water and sanitation programs, reconstructive surgery programs (Interplast and ROMAC), friendship exchanges and disaster relief.

Diversity and Women in Rotary

Rotary International recognises the value of diversity and encourages club membership to reflect individual communities with regard to professional and business classification, gender, age, religion, and ethnicity as the key to the future. Rotary is also dedicated to achieving equality for women around the world by helping local and global communities to improve health and education standards, achieve economic independence, and provide better education for all.

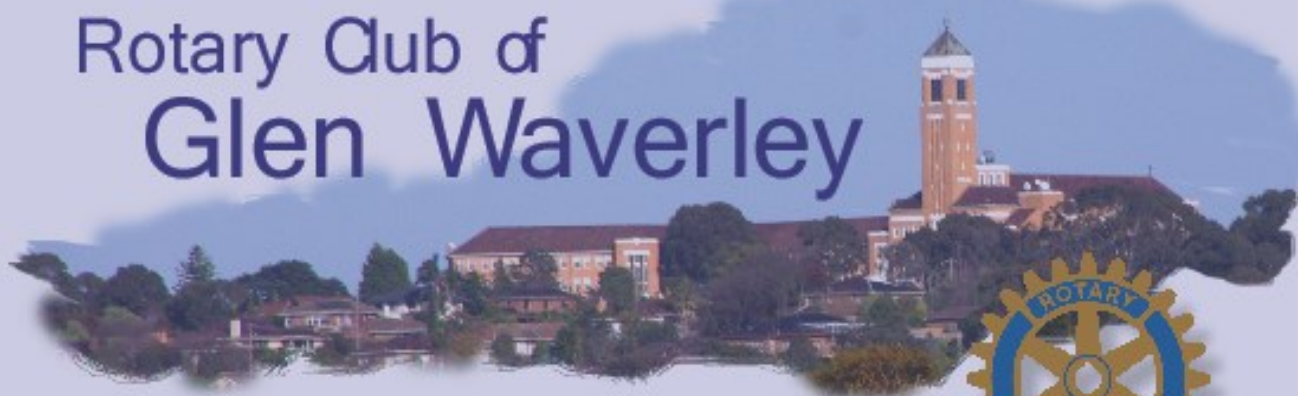
The Rotary Foundation

"Celebrating Women in Rotary"

- Prior to 1989, the Constitution and Bylaws of RI stated that Rotary club membership was for males only.
- In 1978, the Rotary Club of Duarte, California, USA, invited three women to become members.
- The RI Board withdrew the charter of that club for violation of the RI constitution.
- The club brought suit against RI claiming a violation of a state civil rights law that prevents discrimination of any form in business establishments or public accommodations.
- The appeals court and the California Supreme Court supported the Duarte position that Rotary could not remove the club's charter merely for inducting women into the club. The United States Supreme Court upheld the California court indicating that Rotary clubs do have a "business purpose" and are in some ways public-type organizations.
- This action in 1987 allowed women to become Rotarians in any jurisdiction having similar "public accommodation" statutes.
- In October of 1987, the Rotary Club of Angels-Murphys D5220 inducted three women and in spite of threats to quit Rotary by some of the older male members - none did.
- Two of these three women went on to lead the A-M Rotary Club as president and one those completed over two years as charter president of the Angels Camp Centennial Rotary Club (a club which is very proud of its 50% female membership). That President has completed 19 years of perfect attendance.
- The RI constitutional change was made at the 1989 Council on Legislation, with a vote to eliminate the "male only" provision for all of Rotary.
- Since that time, women have become members and leaders of clubs and districts throughout the world.
