PROGRAM: LIFELINE—Tony Bell

Tony commenced by telling us that Lifeline (like RC FTG) will be 50 years old this year.

- Founded by Alan (Sir) Walker after a help seeker suicide.
- 24/7 telephone support service—60 call centres around th country and volunteers have 4 hour shifts. It's tough!
- Good success rate but mentally it is hard on the volunteer. However there is also satisfaction.
- Approx 1,000 staff and 11,000 volunteers.
- Can take 50 calls a day but it can also be 1500.
- Head Office is in Canberra
- There is some face-to-face counselling but this is rare.
- There are rules for volunteers, e.g. confidentiality—address, name, etc.
- Tony spoke of the supervisors (psychiatrists) and the training course devoted to suicide cases.
- **** Phone number is 13 11 14** Everyone should be aware of this number; write it down.
- Spoke of the type of calls received.
- Suicide—leading cause of death in men (Aus) under 45 and women under 34. There are more suicides than road deaths.
- He spoke of the reasons for suicide and how the volunteers handle those cases. Role playing forms part of the training.
- He cited some examples of different calls.

President's Closing Remarks:

PP Graeme closed the meeting with the usual housekeepeing items and again asked for help for Discovery Day.

A FINAL REPORT FROM “OUR GIRL IN DENMARK”.....

So although i am still scratching my head as to how it is already the end of November, I have had to start to prepare for the month they call December. Meaning I get to eat a piece of chocolate everyday. But lets take a step back. I'll go back to September, although I am pretty sure that was only last week!

September meant my mother was coming to visit. A little nervous about it, I made a fool proof plan, including map, drive time and everything!

Waking up on the morning of her arrival, taking the early train to Copenhagen, navigating my way to our hotel, i was just casually sitting there, looking out the window, when I saw my mother walking past the hotel window, and being in such a casual mood, I think to myself 'Hey, its mum.....' and then after a second or two of realisation, i thought 'Hold on! That's my mother! The woman I haven't seen for almost 8 months now!'

So, waiting quietly in the corner, i walked up behind her, and simply said 'Mum?' to which she turned around and hugged me straight away, and we both started crying, although i still don't know why, it was just extremely overwhelming, but after 5 minutes we were back to ourselves, like I saw her yesterday.



We started our whirlwind tour of Denmark in Copenhagen, visiting the walking street, the royal castle, Nyhavn and Christiansborg, before travel-

ling up to visit another castle at Denmark's closest point to Sweden, called Kronborg. I still don't think mum believes that it was Sweden just a few kilometres away across the water.

The next day we drove to Roskilde, where there is a cathedral that has the whole Danish monarchy buried in it. Terry didn't believe the church was so old until he read it was first built in 1175. After our quite interesting visit to Roskilde, and me having to translate everything, we drove a Viking fortress in a town called Slagelse, which dated back to 980.

Next we went to Odense, which is the town i have been living in, we did a bit of sightseeing, and i made my parents arrive in style to visit my host families, yes, by style I mean a bike. Although after much complaining, they went back to Australia and bought bikes themselves.

After Odense we traveled to the mainland of Denmark, called Jutland, or (Jylland in Danish) We visited Aarhus, and Skagen. Skagen is the tip of Denmark, where we saw the two seas meet. We travelled back down Jutland until we got to Legoland, in Billund, and ventured around this amazing place made out of millions of lego pieces! Because Legoland is close to Germany, all the things are in German, Danish and English, unfortunately i picked to go and see the lego movie when the German one was showing, the only language I didn't understand.



After taking every ride at least twice, it was time to leave the park, we were staying at a very nice apartment, and I made my parents a very typical Danish meal of frikadeller, which they rather enjoyed.

The next morning it was time to say goodbye. Which for me was just, 'Okay cya.' but for mum included a lot for hugging and sadness. It was a

little hard to say goodbye, but I didn't realise that for about a week afterwards.

Mum leaving marked the start of October! which meant Autumn holidays! For the first 3 days of the autumn holidays i went to a town in Jutland called Odder, (try pronouncing that in Danish) to visit my an exchange friend on the plane ride over here, called Melanie, she comes from Sale, in district



9820. We have been friends ever since we met on the plane, and I hadn't seen her in about 6 months, so it was time to a visit! We hung out in her town of Odder, and the next day we went up to Dyr Sommerland, which is a big theme park in Denmark! It was tonnes of fun!!

When i came home to Odense, i went with my family to Germany to go border shopping! It is crazy how much beer and chocolate Danes can buy in one go! they go border shopping about 3 times a year.

The day after border shopping I went to Copenhagen with my family to visit Tivoli! Tivoli is the second oldest theme park in Denmark! It opened in 1914, and is the most cosy, beautiful theme park in existence, I am sure of it!

Before i knew it, it was November and i was being shipped off to my whole of Denmark Rotary get together! 200 students from all over Denmark arrived at Stenhus Gymnasium in Holbæk on the 1st of November, for our halloween weekend! It was a totally crazy weekend! meeting all the newbies in Denmark, as well as seeing all the oldies again. We partied all weekend, and I even think a few of my friends didn't sleep!

In November my other Australian friend Kathleen and I made an Australian dinner for my host family. We made Shepherd's pie and Pavlova for dessert! They loved both of them! 2 weekends after I went over the Kathleen's house to help make an Australian dinner for her family! We make roast chicken and bread and butter pudding, and honey joys for the kids. the honey joys were a hit! although the kids thought the bread and butter pud-

ding was a little strange, Me and Kathleen enjoyed it!

Last weekend I went to visit my friend Lauren in Holbæk, me and 3 other girls all came, so we were 5 in all. It was my closest friends from Eerotour and it was our first and last reunion in Denmark. My friend Lauren came up with the idea of awarding us all titles including Miss Selfie, the girl in the group who takes the most photos of herself, and Miss Common Sense, the girl who kept us all alive as we travelled around Europe. It was a incredibly fun weekend, that flew by way too fast!

Next Monday i will present my final presentation to my Danish rotary club, a 15-20 minute presentation in Danish about my year, it has been a hard challenge to write. And then the weekend after that I have my last district gig, which is a farewell gig for me and my other oldies who are going home in January.



In the next few weeks it will be getting ready for Christmas with eating lots of food, finding a Christmas tree and decorating the house. something i am really looking forward to, i have just a month and a half left and its sort of scary how fast things are going. But although i will miss my time here, i am not overly upset to come home and see everyone.

Thank you so much to the Rotary Club of Ferntree Gully, for this wonderful chance of a life time! You've made all my wishes come true. and a big thank you to Enid and Stu for always emailing me to check that I am alive and going well, and of course to my parents for letting me explore the world.
