



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AMBULANCE NEEDED FOR DABAR AND NEIGHBOURING VILLAGES

Prabhatallo Foundation is a charity based in the village of Dabar, near Purulia, which is a District Town in the Indian State of West Bengal. It was founded five years ago and is run by local people with a mission to improve the health and education, infrastructure and employment prospects of local people. They have made real progress with the help of the encouragement and financial support from people and organizations outside India, in particular from Australia. One of their projects has been to set up free medical clinic. A doctor attends a clinic twice a week and now on average about 30 people attend each session. The consultations and medicines are free.

PA Foundation badly need an ambulance to service Dabar and its neighboring villages as presently there is no service at all, government or private, that is available to the public. They need to transport not only patients in need of emergency care but also those who need to undergo outpatient treatment or consultation. They need a reliable vehicle which has space for a stretcher and shelter from the elements for the patient and those assisting.

The main hospital, Deven Mahato Sadar, is fifteen kilometers away from Dabar and even further away from some of the other villages. Given the poor state of the roads and the often inclement weather this distance is difficult for any reliable vehicle to cover, and it becomes impossible for any of the poor in the villages around Dabar, who have no motorized transport at all.


Today, if someone is hurt or has some other medical emergency, he has to be stabilized using local, traditional methods and treatments because to run a local accident provision with modern equipment and techniques would be prohibitively expensive. Then, to get to hospital, people have to hope that some local person with a car or van is willing and able to drive them there. Failing this, people often end up trying to stop passing traffic along the main road into Purulia, hoping somebody will be willing to give them a lift into the hospital.

Too often they never make it to hospital, resulting in a tragedy which might have been avoided elsewhere.

The lack of emergency transport particularly affects pregnant women. Sanjay Kumar Mahato, the Secretary of PA Foundation Tinku is one of the very few people who have a car or van. And in fact over the last five years he has himself has driven over 100 women to hospital while they were in labour. Unfortunately, three of these women died and about 20 actually gave birth in the van before they could reach hospital. Added to other sorts of emergencies he has averaged almost one emergency run every week over the last five years. In the event his van is now too old and unreliable to be counted on for this purpose.

People also need transport to go to hospital as outpatients. People in this area have never been able to get this sort of treatment. Clearly the lack of transport is a major obstacle. But another problem sometimes not considered is that, for poor sometimes illiterate people, to attend at hospital for consultation or treatment may well be a very new, even bewildering experience. The doctors, midwives and nurses working through PA Foundation are qualified and experienced. Because they are known and trusted by the villagers, outpatient treatment can now be an option. These medical staff can advise people as to what treatment is required, where to get it and how to go about arranging it. Having an ambulance would mean that the patients can get to the hospital on time and nurses can even accompany them and their families to the hospital for first consultations or when they need an operation.

When outpatient treatment becomes available and practical, ailments can be treated early, before the problem becomes chronic or possibly fatal. So even when a happy day passes and there is no emergency to deal with, the ambulance will provide a valuable service, providing the chance for a real improvement in people's health by making the central hospitals available to them.
