

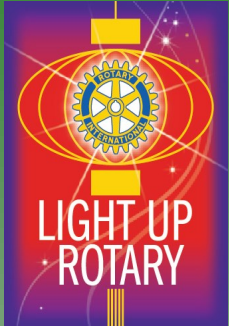

PROGRAM: Australian Rotary Health—Glenn Tippett

- Initiative for fundraising came from Medical Research in 1981. All money raised went into Cot Deaths (SIDS) research.
- Year 2000—Major research focus changed to Mental Illness, following the reasoning of "Don't throw money at the problem, throw the money at the research to find the solution to the problem".
- Average age of a white Australian male is 84 yrs. Indigenous Australian is 38 years.
- ARH has a Rural Nursing Scholarship. Glenn showed samples of medical professionals who have benefitted from grants for up to 11 years of research.
- 10% of new mothers suffer from post natal depression.

Glenn answered a number of questions from members. His presentation focused mainly on the research side of Australian Rotary Health and in particular, the depression area.

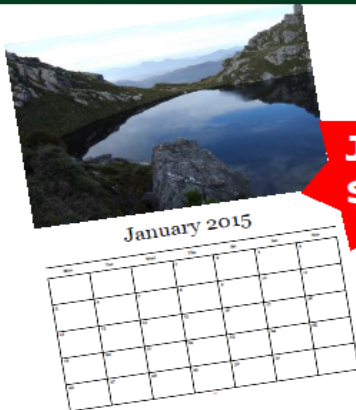

The Rotary Club of Fern Tree Gully's Family Tree.

The **Rotary Club of Melbourne** was the first Rotary Club in Australia [21st April, 1921]. Founded by Lieutenant-Colonel J. Layton Ralston, C.M.G., D.S.O., President of the Halifax Rotary Club & James W. Davidson, F.R.G.S., Past President of the Calgary, Canada – Special Commissioners from Rotary International for the purpose of establishing Rotary in Australia.

The **Rotary Club of Melbourne** sponsored the Rotary Club of Dandenong who, with Rotary founder, **Paul Harris** present, received their Charter on Wednesday, 3rd July, 1935.

The **Rotary Club of Dandenong** in turn sponsored the Rotary Club of Belgrave, who received their Charter on 17th June, 1954.

The **Rotary Club of Belgrave**, after sponsoring the Rotary Club of Bayswater in 1962, **sponsored the Rotary Club of Fern Tree Gully**. Our Charter is dated -16th May, 1963.

Island walk leads to computers for Cambodia



A journey of some 70 kilometres began with the first step of a non-stop walk around Phillip Island, Vic, in 2011 by local Rotarian Stevie Guilmartin (now O'Reilly) and, after many more steps, she had raised \$7250. It was the beginning of another journey that helped build a school in Cambodia and, through a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant, provided vital equipment for its students.

Many Rotarians in South Gippsland are supporters of local charity Bryn's School. Set up in 2003 by the family of Bryn Hendry, who at the age of 16 took his own life, it perpetuates Bryn's memory by building schools that give children a chance for an education they would otherwise not receive.

One of these schools in the Cambodian village of Koung Tonle Kroum, about two hours drive from Phnom Penh, is now a reality, thanks in part to the Rotary Club of Phillip Island and San Remo's decision to donate \$5000 of Stevie's "walk" money to Bryn's School towards its construction.

Arising from that, the Rotarians saw a challenge: a Rotary project that would provide the school with much-needed equipment for a new computer centre in one of its classrooms. With no previous experience, Stevie suggested her club apply for a Foundation Matching Grant. Generous donations by local Rotary clubs, Koo Wee Rup/Lang Lang and Wonthaggi, plus the balance of "island walk money" underscored their commitment to the project.

During Stevie's 2011 Cambodian visit, support from the Rotary Club of Phnom Penh Metro was sought at an

introductory meeting and it subsequently became host partner in the grant process.

Finally, after two years of persistence, passion and hard work, an application was made and the Foundation then approved a grant that led to the placement of 15 student computers, two teacher laptops, a printer, projector, desks and office equipment, internet connection and, due to the non-existence of electricity, installation of rooftop solar panels. The project cost was some \$25,000.

In November last year, a week after the school received the equipment, Stevie returned, together with John O'Reilly from the Rotary Club of Endeavour Hills, George Hendry and seven South Gippsland Secondary School students, who volunteered their IT skills.

"It was like coming home to a long-lost family and delivering a wonderful, life-changing Christmas present, thanks to Rotarians and our Foundation," Stevie said.

"Our club's commitment to the project's sustainability is evidenced by our assistance with funding the employment of a designated IT teacher over the next two years. And, with programs in place to teach staff computer skills, students will become increasingly competent with this technology." •
