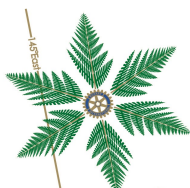

Monday, 13th February 2017

The meeting was opened at 7pm by President Christine.

Presidential Announcements:

President Christine welcomed everyone including the guest speaker Lynette Phuong, speaking about Mongolia) and attending partners (Jill, Emma, Kay and Marg).

After 3 days of "burning snags" over the weekend, sausages are not on the menu! The financial outcomes of the excellent efforts by almost all of the members will be disclosed next week.

There will be a Cluster meeting in the last week of May to agree on a Cluster Foundation Centenary project.

This year's club changeover will be from Christine to Christine (a change of clothes would do? (J) and she suggested a nice dinner out, possibly in the Yarra Valley at Yering Meadows at a cost of about \$60/head – all thought it was a good idea, and Christine will check out suitable venues.

Treasurer: Enid Hughes noted that as District contributions to the MDLC scholarships cease at the end of this Rotary year, we may have to come up with another \$2000 in 2017/18. The grants so far given have enabled students to focus on their studies and do well.

- the Ithacan Philanthropic Society's annual picnic day at Ferny Creek on the Sunday (not the best weather, but everybody enjoyed their day out!) Graeme to negotiate a suitable donation to the Club for our "burning" efforts. during the week.
- The next and final Bikies sizzle will be on next Saturday (same roster).

Youth: Paul Wilson

Paul, Mike, Enid and Ray will attend the District Youth Forum in Rowville on February 28, as will our associate from Fairhills High. Mike suggested that Paul contact St Joseph's to see if they can make it this time (last time, the Director of Student's mum ended up in hospital and she had to back out at the last minute).

Rob Hurst mentioned the confusing and difficult (3.5 hours and still failed!) process to get a WWC ticket – and was then

told he did not need to have one for the Knox Festival, anyway!

Foundation – Mike advised that he will collect portions of everyone's contributions to the Centurion award on a weekly basis (or any other basis that suits your personal financial abilities!) and accumulate them until the individual (approx.) A\$140=US\$100 annual total is reached, at which point Enid will take the money (probably on a quarterly basis) and forward it to the right people in Rotary to gain the Centurion award for the individuals.

Guest Speaker - Lynette Phuong

Born in Melbourne from parents who arrived by boat from Vietnam in 1979, Lynette got a BA from Monash Uni in Commerce/Languages, followed by a Masters in Public Health from Melbourne Uni. She has volunteered for the Red Cross for 11 years, and had half a dozen jobs in the Public Health area.

Her specialist field of study is in non-communicable diseases (NCD). These are expected to affect 80% by 2020, of which 70% will be in developing countries.

Air pollution is a huge problem in developing/Asian areas, with respiratory masks being too costly and/or not able to filter well enough.

She just completed an 18-month project in Mongolia for the United Nations, advising their government on how to set up programs dealing with Nutrition. The major problem is how to get the Mongolian people to change their old bad habits (Too much Tobacco/ Too much Alcohol/Not eating fruit and vegies/Lack of activity/Obesity) which are killing them off in increasing numbers – Life expectancy is only 63 years.

She worked in the (cold!) field (with an interpreter, of course) to gain data and study the problems, and ended up with her recommendations being the basis of the very first Ministerial Order for Nutrition (no mean feat for a foreigner working in a short time-frame!). In addition, she set up a mentoring program for the Public Health Practitioners Association (including teaching the mentors English).

The Mongolian climate was horrific (-50C to -60C in the Northwest areas), and livestock stock deaths have increased from an expected animal lifetime of 10 years to one of 3 years (this for a nation/culture who are all **BIG** meat-eaters!) She shared lots of great photos and some great experiences with us, and was presented with the "FTG magic biro" and great applause – Lynette is a very talented and dedicated person doing great things for others!

President Christine read out next week's housekeeping duties and closed the meeting at 8.55 pm (A longer session than usual - but very interesting)

MONTHLY REPORT

31st January 2017

The two projects discussed at the November Committee Meeting were tabled at the December Board Meeting, voted on and passed:-

The New Zealand Earthquake disaster (\$1,000)

Rotary Club of Clayton's project – Moradabad Mobile Health Camps – India (\$1,000)

The NZ disaster was funded from the Benevolent Fund (Ivan Gigovic's bequest). The Moradabad will be funded from the Projects Account.

Due to the Christmas break no further international projects have yet been considered.

No formal meeting as such but a number of issues as listed below have been worked through.

- Knoxbrooke Inc. 50th Anniversary. Rotary Club of Fern Tree Gully is to man a Registration and Information booth at the rear entrance to the complex. This will be intended to gather information as to who may be interested in assisting Knoxbrooke in their endeavours going forward and to hand out pamphlets and information regarding their activities. This will give us a chance to include some material of our own.
- Build 3 raised garden beds at Knoxbrooke to tidy up an area which is a bit rundown at the moment. Still to be in touch with Bunnings to check if they will help and to get prices.
- Approach Knox Council to see where we can do a tree planting activity in the local area. This activity is to fit in with Ian Risely's idea of getting every Rotarian to plant a tree to help the environment. I am hoping we can actually get more than one site.
- Work with Knox Council to see if we can erect a seat somewhere along the bike path beside the train line between Glengollan Village and Boronia shopping centre so that people have somewhere to sit and rest when they walk into Boronia. Have been in touch with Knox Council and they have advised me that they have received funding in this year's budget for a number of seats, one of which will be beside the bike path in Underwood Rd. They will do a site inspection and then get the seat installed by their contractors which is necessary because of ongoing public liability issues.
