Monday, 3rd July, 2017

Meeting opened at 7pm with President Christine welcoming members and our guest speaker Hayley Matushka.

President's Announcements:

Our Guest Speaker Hayley Matushka gave members an informative account of her three days at Queenscliff back in January this year where she was a participant in the Conoco Phillips Science Experience. Hayley spends a lot of time at Phillip Island and has a keen interest in marine life and enjoys snorkelling. During her three day course Hayley spent time studying Fresh Water and Salt Water marine habitats, Learning more about Marine Biology and even snorkelling with Banjo Sharks. She also learnt about Abalone and why it can be worth as much as \$1,000.00 a kilo on the black market. The advantages of fish farming, advice about jobs and careers, learning to identify the different bugs that live in the water and also identifying different species of fish were other items on the agenda.

Community: Ray Hollis. Organisation of the Dutch Auction to raise funds for Indigenous Eye Health (namely Trachoma) to be held at a later date (possibly early next year) is progressing with 7 confirmed donations to date and 6 others to call on again with positive vibes. Next item on the agenda is to organise venue and date.

Community tree planting day is to take place at Ferny Creek Reserve in New rd or Ferndale Rd upper Ferntree Gully. It has been suggested that we do a number of similar projects throughout the community over the next 12 months. The 1st of these will probably some planting at Ferntree Gully North PS.

Youth: Paul Wilson. Paul gave us a brief update on the latest happenings in the youth program which of course culminated last Tuesday with the Inauguration of the Interact Club at Fairhills High School.

While we are on the subject of Youth there was mention in Christine's opening remarks regarding sponsorship of a local youth. The student's grandmother wrote to the club asking whether we would be able to help raise some funds to enable him to take part in a Schools International Youth Exchange. After hearing of his and his Mum's struggle over the last few years it was a unanimous decision to help this young man with a donation of \$500.

- Every year the District also has great assistance from all the District Leadership Team, which includes the Assistant Governors. Thank you all for everything you have done, we all do appreciate it.
- In the directory, there are 17 pages of names/groups of Rotarians who take responsibility for a range of areas, programs, projects and activities – thank you all for enabling us all to participate in what you do. Please remember just how valuable your contribution is to us and the people we help here and overseas.

We have had an exceptional group of presidents this year to whom all of us owe our appreciation for the huge job you've done. John Germ refers to his governor group as the "All Stars" and I believe we should share that with you too – you've been magnificent "All Stars" Presidents.

Reflection

Over the year I've seen a number of clusters working more effectively together to raise the Rotary profile in the local area. This also enables clubs to support one another in areas where it might be more difficult to operate as a single club. One of the obvious examples which David and I have encouraged over the last 2 years is cluster based Rotaract clubs which have so much to contribute now and in the future. I hope we hear more about that possibility later.

The growth of Interact clubs this year is a cause for celebration – we now have nine clubs with more than five additional ones in the wings. Salwan Shahine is working with clubs and schools exceptionally well and we were delighted to attend the Charter of the Fairhills High School Interact Club on Tuesday afternoon. This club is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Fern Tree Gully. Another of the highlights for me was our District Conference which I wrote about in detail in the April newsletter. That has been reinforced with the comments from others as we attend the various changeovers, it's always good to be prompted to remember what we can do together.

One consistent message I remember from Governors since 2010, is the value of partnerships. Those clubs which have established partnerships with a range of organisations, I'm sure would endorse that. Everything I've said about working as clusters and the value of partnerships is connected to ensuring the relevance of Rotary within our local communities – that is definitely the way to survive and thrive.

Membership in our District remains a serious challenge. To date this year, we've added 98 new members, which is fantastic. Sadly, that is counterbalanced by losing 90. The membership team has done great work this year and we all recognise there is more to be done. I must confess I still see this as our greatest challenge.

At the District Changeover I was delighted to pass on a message which arrived that morning from Juliet and Ian Riseley, I quote "we send our very best wishes and heartiest congratulations for the year past and the year to come. We are very aware that the "work of Rotary" is done in the clubs and Districts by Rotarians just as you who are in the room there and our admiration is for all of you."

Returning to my orchestral analogy, I know we will all continue to make wonderful music together in this district so that, as John Germ says, "Together we all accomplish more".

Frank and I pass on our very best wishes to Malcolm Chiverton and his team as they have the great privilege to serve the district in Ian Riseley's year of international leadership as we participate in Rotary Making a Difference.
