Hello donors to the Rotary Australia World Community Service 2016 NZ Earthquake Appeal

I wanted to provide you with an update on how this project is progressing, and apologies for not providing this information sooner.

What follows is some background to the process we have undertaken in the allocation of your generous funding. In total we were able to allocate just over \$AU28,000. The latest progress report from the recipients has been attached.

Initially, following the earthquake, we were advised by our NZ counterparts that the NZ Earthquake was a very localised event with small numbers physically affected notwithstanding the massive damage to road and rail over a long stretch of highway where there are few homes. The locality worst hit was Kaikoura which had sanitation issues and the residents were issued with chemical toilets. In the smaller settlements, all would have been on septic tanks. Local Councils had the issue in hand with Army support getting supplies in to restock supermarkets and delis etc. There was a concern that well-meaning people would flood the place with food, aid etc that would only harm the business community. The people in the region are not poor. The NZ Government has announced a financial package to ensure tourist operators are provided for.

In setting up the RAWCS Project we wanted to ensure that community generosity had an outlet, however as time went on it became clear that the immediate needs were being met by Government and local agencies - unlike the responses in many developing communities. It was thought that a project may emerge to which your funds could be put, however this took some time and when the selected project emerged, we were very happy to see it go ahead.

In agreement with the New Zealand equivalent of RAWCS, RNZWCS, we transferred all your funds to the agreed project - using Music Therapy to **alleviate the anxiety and stress that the children of the Seddon and the Ward Schools in Marlborough, New Zealand, are suffering as a result of the November 2016 Kaikoura Earthquake** (see attached project proposal)

Rotary in NZ observed that children exhibiting stress and anxiety (which was affecting their schooling) were not fully addressed after the 2010-11 Christchurch earthquakes. By not addressing these needs there's been an increase in anxiety based behaviours often leading to violence within the home and schools, and lawlessness still manifesting in the community six years on.

This **Music Therapy program** (through the Rotary Club of Blenheim South) will assist 32 children to improve their behavioural stresses, mental health, cognitive development and restore family and teacher relationships, and eliminate the anxiety and stress levels for all students within schools and improve teacher/student environment. This will also impact on their families, the school(s) and teacher environment and wider community.

I hope to provide you with further reports on the project as it proceeds.
