This information arose from his recent visit to the club with his wife Karen. Christine then went on to explain District 9810's intention to put forward a proposal to the Council of Legislation regarding the possible amalgamation of District 9810 with another District.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORTS:

Secretary: Paul McAloney. Advised that the mail has been distributed.

NEXT WEEKS MEETING TO START AT 6.30 PM WITH ATTENDANCE BY SOME OF THE RJCA STUDENTS.

Treasurer: Enid Hughes. Enid explained that the club's Administration funds account is slightly in the red at the moment and that we need to keep having occasional revenue raising activities such as the lunches that Martin and Emma put on 4 times a year. This helps to augment our operating expenses and therefore helps to keep our annual subscriptions in check.

Youth: Paul Wilson. On Wednesday evening RC of Fern Tree Gully with the help of our local MP Nick Wakeling we presented students from Fern Tree Gully North PS and Fairhills PS with certificates in recognition of the work that they had done throughout the year for the RJCA program. After the presentation about 50 Students, Parents, Teachers and Rotarians adjourned to the bowling club for dinner.

Community: Ray Hollis. Still progressing with planning for our Dutch Auction in February next year. Have written to a number of the wineries in the Yarra Valley but unfortunately without any success. We are continuing to approach businesses for donations and sponsorship and this will continue.

Vocational: Gary Braddock. The torchlight tour of Ferntree Gully cemetery was quite interesting and informative but the weather could certainly have been better. Gary has contacted RDIK and is organising another visit for sometime in April 2018. Also under investigation is the possibility of attending a Vocational visit to Boeing Aerostructures in Port Melbourne which I believe would be very interesting.

PR and Marketing: I have posted a few articles over the month of November. Visit by our speaker Alex Ioannidis to tell us about Trachoma, the joint meeting between the Rotary Clubs of Ferntree Gully and Bayswater to present a blazer to our outgoing exchange student and also the presentation of the RJCA awards.

International: Enid Hughes. Our \$1,000 contribution to the Moradabad Mobile Health Camps project in India has been made. The global grant was awarded and the project has commenced.

We have committed \$2,000 to the Timor Leste project which, given they get the global grant, will commence in January. The Rotary Club of Fern Tree Gully currently sponsors 10 students at the Nasavusavu Special Ed School. This commitment will increase to 15 students next year. Unfortunately, due to a problem between RC Savusavu and the ABCD Board in Australia we have been asked to hold the funds for 2018. Two of our independent sponsors have decided not to continue and the children that were sponsored by this arrangement will be taken up in the club's additional 5 students.

Fundraising: Graeme Aspinall. Another successful day at Buntings last month with profit in excess of \$500 and another tour of duty this Friday, December 8th.

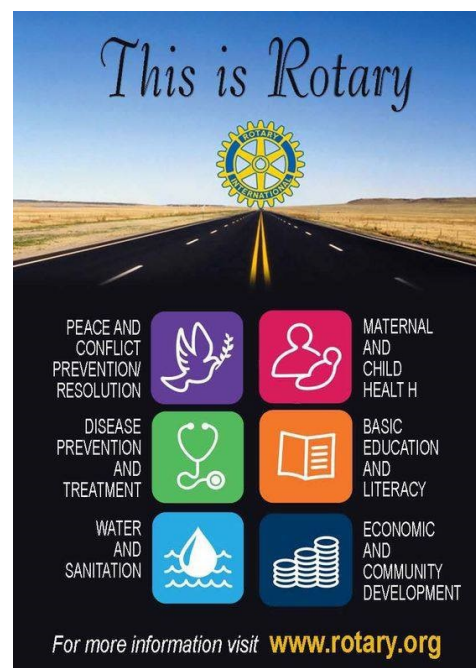
Fellowship: Fran Mandergeddes. Our recent night out at the 1812 Theatre to see Nunsense was well attended with mixed reviews.

ROTARY JUNIOR COMMUNITY AWARD

The Rotary Junior Community Award is a program aimed at giving young children the opportunity to develop attitudes towards volunteerism by assisting organisations and people in need, to learn about their own community, to develop healthy attitudes towards physical recreation and to develop new skills.

The Award is based on the Duke of Edinburgh Award but with modifications to suit a younger age group and also a different set of aims. The Duke of Edinburgh Award commences with the Bronze Award for children who are 14 years of age. The Rotary Junior Community Award is for children in Year 6 in Primary School.

The Award is non-competitive and can be designed to cater for the mental and physical capabilities of all children. The program is readily adaptable to children in small rural schools or the large urban school. It is based on a series of activities that take place during the first three terms of the year, (the first year a pilot program over one term is recommended). Each participating child has the opportunity to design the activities to suit their own set of skills and opportunities. Adults monitor their progress.

The Award asks children to focus on four main aspects of community life;

- Community Service where children help other people.
- Skills, where children learn a new hobby or interest,

- Physical Recreation with the accent on participation as well as performance and

- Social Experience where children take part in a range of community activities including a community celebration, a community meeting, a cultural exchange, a religious experience and an arts performance.

The Award is administered by a co-ordinator from the sponsoring Rotary Club and a supervisor (parent or teacher) from each school. Each child has a special diary for designing their own program and recording their activities. The Awards are presented at a Presentation Night organised by the Rotary Club towards the end of the School year.

Primary schools should become involved because:

- In today's world there is uncertainty that children are developing the attitudes needed to create a better world.
- This program trains children to develop the same high moral and ethical standards that we as Rotarians follow.
- It is an excellent way to become involved with a younger age group than Rotary Clubs normally do.
- Participation enables the school to show the way for other schools and families to follow in the training of children for future leadership roles.



The Rotary Club of Fern Tree Gully has been privileged to run this program with Ferntree Gully North Primary Schools for more than fifteen years now. In the last couple of years Fairhills Primary School have also joined the program. It was wonderful to last week have a joint certificate ceremony for the two schools and to have local MP Nick Wakeling to present the certificates.
