DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S REPORT

Welcome everyone to another New Year!

But in the Rotary year it is the continuation of all those projects we have bubbling away, back to "Service Above Self" after a short break of enjoying more time with our family and friends.

However, over the last few weeks I have approved many District Grant applications. From the 12th December until the 5th February I have awarded Clubs for 6 projects in Australia, 1 in Uganda, 1 in Kiriwina Island, 1 in Tanzania and 1 in Indonesia. The projects were over a range of different areas. The Australian projects were granted to Fund students to Kingston Council's Junior Mayor & Councillors' program; Provide an ECG Machine for Casey Hospital; Help fund mental health first aid courses for City of Monash school teachers; Provide logistics support for Knox City students to attend the 2018 ANZAC service; Fund four selected students to attend schooling at the CIRE Community school; Organise and conduct a community forum on family health. The International projects were granted to Fund supplies for a 5-student medical team to Suubi Clinic; Provide costs for on-site construction of 100 2-seat desks for primary schools; Fund 4 semesters of Bachelor of Law course for a student at Makumira University, Arusha; Provide and distribute impregnated mosquito nets for communities on Sabu Island.

Also, on the 17th January a Global Grant was approved for the establishment of Tertiary Educational Curricula to reduce violence against women and children in Timor Leste. Just viewing these 11 projects for the Christmas New Year period shows

our charity of choice, The Rotary Foundation never stops, especially when you realise there are another 536 Districts throughout the world who too would also be awarding a variety of grants.

The Rotary Foundation provides the money for these Grants from the Annual giving that Clubs in the District made 3 years previously.

This month being February, has seen the RI exchange rate strengthen from \$1.32 to \$1.24 so now is a great time to make your payment goal to the Annual Giving Fund. By paying now you get the benefit of the stronger dollar plus have more to spend on those other Club projects with which you are involved.

We have two Youth Service Seminars coming up in the next couple of weeks. A great event for Clubs to get their new members and those passionate members for youth programs to attend. The presentations by the past youth program participants will inspire your members to get involved and support our youth programs.

2nd -4th March, yes, the dates of the District Conference in Bendigo! Please check out the website <http://www.9810rotaryconference.org.au> and register. Especially the first-time attendees where the District is providing a lunch with the Guest Speaker, Anette Løwert who is a Past District Governor and also the partner of the RIPPR (Rotary International Presidents Personal Representative) Per Høyen, at no cost to first time attendees.

Continue to "Make A Difference" in all your Rotary endeavours and Karen and I look forward to seeing everyone in Bendigo.

Rotary Australia World Community Service

Why use RAWCS to assist you when your Club does an overseas project or when it wishes to do a benevolent project within Australia providing direct relief to people in need?

RAWCS is set up as a national business by the District Governors of Australia so that Rotary Clubs within Australia may take advantage of The Federal Governments Taxation concessions by providing a centralised reporting organisation whilst at the same time allowing the individual Clubs autonomy and ownership of projects to be maintained. The Rules of RAWCS define the authority and identify the framework.

In addition RAWCS provides a public list of all current projects including information of any assistance (\$, Manpower, Equipment) being requested by the Project Manager.

The RAWCS Programs include:

- Rotary Overseas Aid Fund
- Rotary Australia Benevolent Society
- Dick Smith Matched Funding Grant
- Rotary Australia Relief Fund

The RAWCS Activities Include

- Volunteers
- Donations in Kind
- Rotarians Against Malaria
- Water and Sanitation Programs

RAWCS IS NOT THE ROTARY FOUNDATION, BUT A RAWCS PROJECT CAN ALSO BE A ROTARY FOUNDATION PROJECT

RAWCS does not compete with the foundation, it is there to benefit a club with an overseas project that can also include a Global or District grant. They can work together.

RAWCS offers an online donation facility to accumulate your funds and Tax deductibility for donations.
