"THE WEEK THAT WAS"

Wednesday, 26th April 2018

To the President and members of Ferntree Gully Rotary Club:
There was a rather heated debate at our last meeting about the best way forward to deal with the shortfall in our administration account.

I listened to the various arguments put forward and have decided to put my thoughts in writing.

One point of view put forward by a couple of members was that some portion of the income derived from our fundraising activities should go toward covering our operating overheads, this was strongly objected to by some others.

The reasons put forward for objecting were quite valid at an emotional level, however we have to face reality!

As was explained by our treasurer the small membership number is the reason behind the shortfall, the absence of a single member let alone multiple members away on holidays et cetera has an immediate impact on cash flow as the fixed and other necessary overheads don't change.

Whilst I don't disagree with the reasoning behind the shortfall the circumstances within the club have changed considerably since I first joined Rotary in 1981 when the club had 32 members.

Back then in order to be invited to join Rotary you had to meet certain requirements, you either had to be in business or in senior management to qualify for membership. Preferably there would be only one representative from each vocation although there was provision for an additional active member but with a maximum of 2. Which meant that from memory 100% of the members were active in business or employment of some type.

Today the circumstances within our club are entirely different, a significant proportion of the membership are either retired, or semi-retired in which case most likely on fixed incomes. Our members have worked long and hard over many years to provide for a comfortable retirement and I don't think it's fair they should be expected to make up the shortfall in our club's revenue stream in order to continue to enjoy the fellowship of Rotary membership.

There was concern that by utilising a small portion of the income from our fundraising activities to cover our overheads would be misleading the public as they are under the impression that every dollar they contribute goes in full toward some worthy cause.

I think the public's perception of Rotary is such that they don't question as to what we do with the money we raise when we're down there at Bunnings selling sausages or whatever. I believe that Rotary's reputation worldwide is a sufficient for them to understand the good that Rotary does in the world and that there has to be some means of covering our costs to simply exist.

Reiterating my previous comments about members circumstance today if some consideration is not given to relieving the strain on members having to continuously contribute from their own pocket to make up the shortfall there will be an impact on membership retention.

ABOUT OPERATION CLEFT

Operation Cleft is a unique Rotary project that provides free cleft repair surgery for underprivileged children in Bangladesh. Because cleft repair surgery is not covered under Bangladesh's overburdened public health care system, thousands of children grow to adulthood with this condition untreated.

Because of the way they look, these children are ostracised by society. Many suffer from ear, nose and throat infections as well as depression and malnutrition.

By surgically repairing their cleft lip and/or palate, we are providing them with an opportunity to lead a normal life, to get an education, to build a social network and to reach their full potential as contributing members of their community. And the cost of each operation – just \$AUD300.

Operation Cleft provides free cleft lip and cleft palate repair surgery for underprivileged children in Bangladesh. We “Gift a Smile for Life”.

Why Bangladesh?

- Bangladesh is a developing nation of over 160 million people with around 40% living on or below the poverty line.
- Approximately 300,000 people are living with an untreated cleft lip or cleft palate in Bangladesh.
- More than 5,000 children are born with a cleft lip or cleft palate each year.
- Surgical repair of clefts is not covered under Bangladesh's public healthcare system.
- For a low-income family, the normal cost of a repair operation (around 60,000 taka or A\$820) is unaffordable as it is more than their annual income.
