Foundation (Mike Spark): reminded members that he is still accepting donations towards becoming a Rotary Centurion this year.

Sergeant-At-Arms: Whilst relieving us of our hard-earned money Mike Spark explained why men are never depressed (which was because they have women to do all the work for them)

Skill: won by Paul Wilson with ticket W 51 (a bit suss though as he was handing out the tickets when we paid our dinner money)

PROGRAM: Habitat for Humanity—Max & Jan Thomson

Habitat for Humanity is the world's number one not-for-profit provider of housing and improved shelter for low income families. It was established in 1976 in the USA as a Christian based humanitarian not-for-profit organisation. It is nondenominational and has expanded into 90 countries and so far has built

over 1 million homes.

To date there has been 160 houses built in Australia, somewhere in the world new houses are handed over to deserving families every 4 minutes.

Habitat for Humanity Victoria was established in 1988 and has partnered with over 50 families to help them in to homeownership.

First one was built at Crib Point. It is planned to complete 100 x 2020 and so far 58 have been built in Metropolitan Melbourne, Mornington Peninsula, and Regional Victoria. The program is based on an ownership model with the recipient families assisting in the construction of the home and are funded into it once completed. They take title to the property and for many it is the first time in their lives they have owned a home. It makes for a stressfree and happy lifestyle for the family.

Our speakers Max and Jan have been involved for 10 years, Max is the Victorian treasurer and Jan works in the volunteer opportunity shops raising funds for the program.

In addition to the program in Australia there is a Global Village Program to assist families in impoverished countries such as Fiji and other Pacific islands.

Chairman Allan thanked Max and Jan for the presentation and gave them our usual secret USB

We flew from Melbourne to Vancouver, via Los Angeles, using United Airlines. Won't be doing that again!

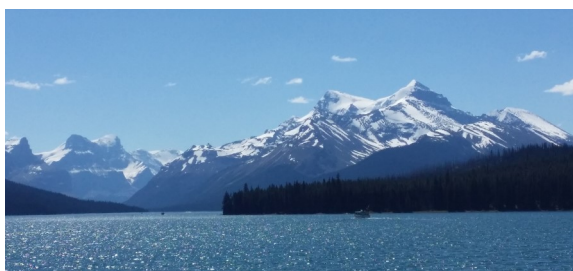
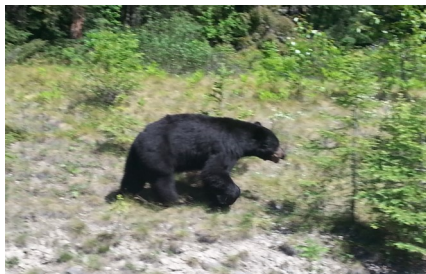
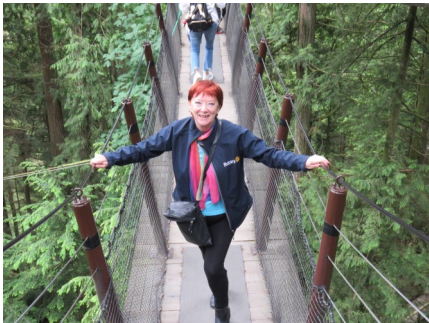
Arrived in Vancouver and had a wonderful time with me getting totally lost in a city I once lived and worked in.
