Member Behind the Badge:

Graeme Aspinall was the first of our members to present "Member Behind the Badge". See below for a condensed version of it:

It all began in February 1947, born to parents who lived in Malvern. At the age of 9 years my father died. WE certainly

missed out on a lot not having a father around however Legacy was there to help Mum and guide my younger brother and myself through our early development times.

After primary school I attended Caulfield Technical College up to 4th Form (year 10). Not into playing sport I was selling papers for a number of years. This helped the family as good money could be made on race days.

I was able to start a 4 year apprenticeship in toolmaking at Kempthorne Lighting in 1965. It was during this time I met Ruby while at a dance in Morwell one weekend. As Ruby was living and working in Camberwell we started dating and later married in 1970. Not long after our marriage Ruby learned she had MS however this did not stop us having a normal life as we didn't understand what it was. MS began to take more control of Ruby after Travis was born in 1982 until she died in 2008.

In 1976 I joined Apex which was a young man's service club similar to Rotary but more focused on local community service. I was Zone President (similar to a Rotary DG) in 1985-86. After 11 years and reaching 40 you have to leave Apex. Stuart Vize invited me along to a Rotary meeting and 30 years later I'm still here. During this time I've enjoyed my time in this Club although there have been some ups and downs. My current role as an AG is one I'm really enjoying.

Other working experiences have been at Hayman Reese 19 years and Heineman Electric 10 years in Manufacturing Management roles.

Nasavusavu Special Education School.

- Several emails have been exchanged between RC Savusavu and ourselves.
- We have reaffirmed that our club intends to continue with our decision to sponsor fifteen students at Yaroi. I am awaiting confirmation of names.

Pramanit Foundation, New Dehli, India

- I have not heard from either Lorraine Young, nor Pramanit Foundation and I am recommending the club forget this project.

Rotary Club of Savusavu – Global grant project

- I have had a response from RCS and they are excited about the possibility of us joining with them in a project. A number of the members (a small club like ours) have been away on holiday but they have promised to get back to us shortly.

TeamMed – Nepal

- Nisal Punchihewa is a 4th year medical student from Monash University and he is reaching out for our help as a member of TeamMED - a university club for Monash medical students. He is hoping that we will provide his team with support for their upcoming volunteering trip to Nepal in December.
- The project involves the setting up of temporary medical clinics in rural Nepal to provide much needed medical care to locals. TeamMed are in need of funds to buy the medications and to pay local Nepalese translators who will join them.
- I have replied to Nisal indicating there is a strong possibility we will support him and have arranged for him to give us a short (10 min) presentation on 27th September at which time I plan to give a donation from our Benevolent Fund.
