



TREASURERS REPORT 2012/13

ADMINISTRATION

As in previous years, the Admin account was budgeted well with members' fees being kept to that of the previous year - \$260.00 per annum. There were sufficient funds in the account to cover those costs associated with the celebration of our 50th Anniversary which were not covered by the amount charged to attendees.

PROJECTS

As far as fundraising is concerned we did a little better than last year but unfortunately still didn't manage to completely cover the monies donated. We had a shortfall of \$592. However, we were able to draw on funds left over from a previous year so did not finish up the year 'in the red'.

BENEVOLENT FUND

In accordance with the wishes of our benefactor, International donations were made to a number of recipients who were not covered by the Rotary Foundation. This account was managed well and finished up the year with a small surplus which can be added to next year's budget.

SUMMARY

Overall the club's accounts have been reasonably well managed with funds being distributed in accordance with the Board of Directors' wishes. Regrettably, the breathometers have not turned out to be as lucrative as was first expected but have still contributed to the club's funds and will continue to do so in the future.

Some of the projects we participated in were:

- The Annual Tin Rattle to raise funds for our two local CFA brigades. Ferntree Gully and Upper Ferntree Gully. Upper Ferntree Gully are putting the funds towards purchasing a defibrillator, as well as allocating some funds towards the upgrade of the slip on utes.
- The donation of funds towards a community vehicle for the police to use.
- The implementation of breathalyser machines into four venues, ie
 - Cuckoo Restaurant, Olinda
 - Wantirna Club, Wantirna
 - Mooroolbark Bowling Club
 - Terminus Hotel Healesville

I have realised that there are always a lot of programs that could use our support. It is a challenge to work out which program to support, and which program would benefit by being passed onto another community group to work with, like the commemorative garden that a local nursery took on.

It was an interesting year, one that I was disappointed by the outcomes at times, and very happy and positive with the efforts at other times. Thanks to all those who supported me, and all the club members who rally when they are needed.

We continue to support the **Foothills Community Church in a range of ways**

- Community kitchen. A fortnightly roster on a Wednesday evening to assist with food preparation, serving, washing up and most importantly spending some time with diners. A huge thank you to those who attend on a regular basis.
- \$200 to Christmas lunch
- Provision of gifts for men at Christmas time. (The church advised that this is a particularly difficult group to provide for). The club was successful in providing several hundred individual items which were then put in Christmas gift bags to be handed out to the recipients.

The Salvation Army tin rattle went well raising in excess of \$7,000.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE REPORT

Once again it has been a busy year for the club regarding International. The club has supported the following projects:

Cambodian Children's Trust:

The good new here is that the family we have been supporting for the last two years has become independent, in that both the parents have employment and the children are attending school. They now have a quality of life that they never would have achieved had they not had our support. I have now asked the Cambodian Children's Trust to nominate another family for us to sponsor.

Timor-Leste Project

During the year District 9810 asked clubs to participate in a district fundraiser to raise money to build a family children's home in Timor-Leste. The club donated \$1,000 to this worthwhile project.

Art Building Children's Dreams

The club has made a commitment to educate four children in Fiji from primary school through to secondary education. Some people may ask "why bother?" There is no doubt about the link between poverty and education. Without education poverty will continue to effect over half the world's population – nearly 3 billion people who live on less than \$2.00 per day. People living in poverty have little or no choice about where and how they live, and without a sound education that will continue to be the case. Incidentally, two of our members have felt so strongly about this project that they have each decided to sponsor a child privately.

Bucalevu – Fiji

Rotary is building an 80-bed dormitory for girls

attending a school in Fiji. Because this is a project which qualifies for a Rotary Foundation grant our club cannot participate using our benefactor's funds. Instead, we are donating \$1,000 towards the construction of the school toilets.

Taveuni – Fiji

The club participated in a project instigated by the Rotary Club of Chelsea to purchase a new vehicle for the Taveune islanders for use in delivering supplies to the villages around the island. Our donation of \$500 was the last sum required to purchase the vehicle.

District Governor's Partner's Fund

The club presented a cheque for \$200 to the DG's wife whose pet project for the year was the Cambodian Children's Fund. (A separate organisation to the CCT).

Wheelchairs for Kids

We have again been pleased to make a donation to Wheelchairs for Kids. Monies have been collected from the wishing well located in the gaming room at The Knox Tavern. I would like to thank the management of this establishment and their patrons, for their generosity. I hope all the patrons' wishes come true!

Benevolent Fund

We also thank our benefactor, the late Ivan Gigovic whose generosity has enabled the club to continue our International Service work.







Enid, along with support from President Graeme, has supported our exchange student for this year, Caroline Wilhjelm, with numerous activities and outings she has enjoyed whilst in our care. Additionally, Paul has been fantastic in his support and encouragement of our relationship with Ferntree Gully North Primary School, as well as the establishment of implementing the Junior Youth Community Award at an additional school – Fairhills Primary School.

JUNIOR YOUTH COMMUNITY AWARD

We have enjoyed Caroline's attendance at our meetings and the opportunity to hear from her of her "Aussie" experiences. She has represented her family well and been a fine ambassador for her country.

Only a couple of months back, Graeme and Enid, along with some Rotarians from Waverley and Forest Hill clubs attended a Rotary meeting at Healesville. The main purpose of the meeting was to present two of the recently returned Youth Exchange Students with a recognition award for their written achievements during their year over-seas. Our own Damien Croke won the award. For his effort, he received a cheque for \$200 and a commemorative plaque.

Our outbound student, Kate left us in January to travel to Denmark. We have had some communication back from her and she too, is flying the Aussie flag in a favourable manner and enjoying the experiences afforded to her. We eagerly await her return when we can catch a glimpse of what life has been like for her in a foreign land. Maybe she will have the opportunity to share her experiences with Princess Mary, one of our most famous exports!

During this time David's wife had their 2nd child and all was going well for the McFarlaine's. Whilst at work in December 2010 a severe storm hit Melbourne. Severe winds caused a large timber panel to come away from its fixings and contact David's back as he was working.

David's road to recovery has been a difficult one where he has had to undergo intensive physio treatment at Epworth Rehabilitation Centre.

David returned to AGA's training centre to work at a modified capacity to gain fitness to be fit for placement. David was unable to achieve this and had to reassess his career options. David's positive outlook on life has seen him undertake additional training so he can redirect his career.



Virginia Rutledge ROTARY'S BOWELSCAN PROGRAM 2012/13.

Again this year our club continued to be involved in this very worthwhile program. Our Rotary District (9810) has been running this program since 2003 - our club started from 2007.

Along with many other clubs, we arrange to sell Bowelscan test kits through some local pharmacies. Local newspapers have again helped promote this public awareness & early detection program. Men & women 40 years & over are encouraged to buy & use this non-invasive test which can detect unseen blood in the bowel motion which can be an early sign of Bowel cancer or polyps(likely future cancers).

This year the price has maintained at 10.00 – however this is still half the price of commercial kits.

The Federal government bowel cancer screening program continues again but only targets those turning 50, 55 & 65 - however anyone receiving a free kit from the government can use it instead of a bowelscan kit.

year is still valid, vital and will continue.

We know that every year in Australia there are going to be 12,000 new cases of bowel cancer and 5,000 deaths from bowel cancer. Fifteen men and seventeen women living in Melbourne's eastern suburbs had life-saving procedures during the past six years following early detection by using a Bowelscan test kit.

This year we sold 216 kits through our 3 pharmacies – Upper Ferntree Gully, Mountain Gate and Stud Park. Of these 216 kits at the time of going to print we have had 178 returned.

Thanks again to John Flemming for co-ordinating the delivery of new kits & collection of used ones from all the pharmacies.
