



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It's been a turbulent year for our Club as far as venues go, having lost our Knox Tavern venue in September, due to fire. The temporary venue we found at Delgano's did not work out because of the layout and noise factors, but Graeme and John came up with another – our new home, the Ferntree Gully Bowling Club. We have settled in well, and the venue gives us lots of options for different meeting styles and other club/fellowship functions.

The many and diverse activities of the club are described in detail in the individual Chairs' reports, so I won't repeat them here.

The focus for the first part of the year was to find a permanent venue, and throughout the year was to continue to make the club more visible and relevant in our local area. Participation in local/community expos, along with some advertising, has raised our profile, I believe, but much more needs to be done consistently and with greater focus. Exposure is the key to membership growth, not only for Rotary International but also for our great little club. We have to be seen more as significant contributors to our local community to attract like-minded citizens, initially as cause/project supporters and then as potential members.

We have continued to work closely with the other 'Knox Cluster' clubs, and participated with them in supporting the 2015 Knox Festival pilot activity to see if the clubs wished to enter into a long-term agreement to share the planning for and running of the Festival with the Council. Regrettably, at this stage, the majority of the cluster clubs did not feel happy about a complete commitment for the long term. This proposed Rotary/Knox City Council partnership decision can be, and should be, reviewed at a later stage, I believe, but our Club will in any case continue to maintain excellent relations with the Knox City council (the Knox CEO is an honorary member of our club, for example).

Arising directly from the feedback from the Knox Festival event, the recent Cluster Club dinner night in Rowville was an excellent way to share ideas and meet with other Rotarians. This is being encouraged as an ongoing annual or even bi-annual event.

On the Community front, I congratulate Graeme Aspinall on an excellent and expanding program of sausage sizzles and community raffles, all of which bring in much-needed money to support our community and other activities. Other activities are outlined in his report — and they are many and diverse!

On the membership front, we were pleased to welcome Lee Morris and Tim McCarthy in July and August as new members, but disappointed that we lost both during the year (Tim tragically from a heart attack while snorkelling when overseas on holiday in November). Sean Campbell replaced Greg Downes, who was transferred to Le Pines Head Office. Thanks for your company and your contribution to our club, Greg, and we are enjoying Sean's company as he settles in to Rotary and FTG.

On the Fellowship front, Fran Mandergeddes has again been active with our Christmas and changeover functions, the funny theatre nights and many other opportunities to get together, apart from meeting nights, and enjoy each other's company with friends and family. Well done, Fran.

We have ceased to participate in the Youth Exchange Program, after many fulfilling years, as host families become harder to get.

I have met with the CEO of Knoxbrooke (which you will remember from last year's report that we helped set up a long time ago) during the year, and I am sure that we can rebuild our 50-year association (particularly in the next two years, by helping them plan and implement their 50th anniversary celebrations).

Our website is mature and well-informed, providing a focal point for our communications both with our members and the wider community. We are indebted to Enid Hughes for maintaining the website, as well as "looking after the cash, publishing the Bulletin, stepping into all manner of duties and generally keeping errant Presidents in line" (Phil's words from last year, I know – but nothing has changed ©). Thanks very much, Enid.

I was pleased to be informed in June that our Club Secretary for 15 years, John Flemming, was to receive a Victoria Day award from the Ferntree Gully electorate MP, Nick Wakeling in early July. John has done so much for the Club and the FTG and Knox

communities over many decades, and thoroughly deserves this award, in my not-so-humble opinion. Thank you, Stu, for initiating this deserved action.

Thanks to all the members for their valuable contributions during the year to many projects and activities, and I wish you all the best for the new Rotary year.



DID YOU KNOW......

Rotary's early emblem was a simple wagon wheel (in motion with dust). It was designed in 1905 by Montague M. Bear, a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago who was an engraver. He designed the emblem to represent both civilization and movement. Most of the early Rotary clubs adopted the wheel in one form or another. The present emblem, 24 cogs and six spokes, was adopted in 1924. A keyway was added to signify usefulness. An official description of the emblem was adopted at the 1929 International Convention

TREASURER'S REPORT

Managing the funds of a small club is very important but not that difficult so my position as Treasurer has been onerous at times but overall not too traumatic. Once again, speaking financially, the year has been successful with the club being able to do some important work both locally and overseas.

ADMINISTRATION

This year we managed to stay under budget (by a very small margin). This will enable us to keep the fees for 2015-16 at \$260.00 per member. We made no asset purchases this year as the equipment we have was sufficient for our needs.

PROJECTS

Once again our fundraising exceeded our donations; only by a small margin but enough to give us a buffer with which to start the new Rotary year. However, it's worrying to see that the Breathometer machines which were originally seen as a good residual income earner is proving to be not so profitable. This situation will have to be carefully monitored if this project is to remain a viable option for the club.

I must commend Graeme Aspinall and John Flemming for their efforts in fundraising. They have both worked hard and with the assistance of a number of club members have raised enough funds to enable us to participate in some very worthy projects.

BENEVOLENT FUND

As always, the projects funded from this account were handled in strict accordance with the rules set down by our benefactor, Ivan Gigovic. For some years now we have only spent the interest earned on the monies invested. However, due to the prevailing low interest rates which are deemed unlikely to improve for some time it may be necessary to draw down some funds from the principal in order to service ongoing commitments.

Again, our thanks must go to Ivan Gigovic for his generous bequest which enables our club to do some very important international work.

Following on from the success the Club had in raising funds from the Great Community Raffle last year we again, with the commitment of the club, sold more tickets this year. During June and July we sold the majority of our tickets at the Ferntree Gully Plaza. Our members braved the cold wintery days to raise \$2,500. During my absence overseas many members supported John Flemming with their presence on Fridays and Saturdays. Past member Ian McFarlane again helped out on Saturday afternoons; each year everyone he asks buys a ticket. We really appreciate the support he gives our Club during this raffle selling period.

Sausage sizzles at Bunnings raised \$3,745 this year. We were also given the opportunity to trial some extra, weekday sizzles during school holidays. Of course, these turned out to be not as lucrative as the weekends but still well worth the effort. With the support of our club members we were able to take up Bunnings offer and raise an additional \$2,100. The opportunity enabled us to raise much needed funds and gain exposure in the community which is a positive for our club. My thanks go to all our members who are able to help out on these days no matter how much time they are able to give.

We continue to support the Foothills Church with our donation to help fund their annual Christmas luncheon. Fran Mandergeddes continues to collect men's gifts for distribution at this lunch. The Community Kitchen also continues to be well supported by club members who attend every second Wednesday to help out in the preparation of food, the serving and washing up.

Christmas gifts from local real estate agent Ray White's Christmas Gift Giving initiative were again collected and donated to Steve Barrington's Foothills Church for distribution at their Christmas Lunch. The generosity of people at Ray White is very much appreciated by Steve.

The Ferntree Gully Discovery Day held at the end of November. A number of members helped both in organising the event and on the day itself by handing out show bags. Next year we will concentrate on doing more promotion of our Rotary Club. This is the area we need to be seen in.

The two local CFA brigades (Ferntree Gully and Upper Ferntree Gully) held their annual collection in October. This year we were unable to provide the manpower to co-ordinate the collection as in the past. So the brigades took it over. However we assisted in the counting of monies raised and provided limited collectors. The CFA will continue to co-ordinate this fund raiser in future.

The club was again asked by Knox Relay for Life to participate in this annual event with our BBQ stand. Although the number of teams were down on previous years we were kept busy throughout Saturday afternoon and early Sunday morning with egg and bacon rolls. The club donated \$300 toward cancer research from the takings on the day. Special thanks must go to Ferntree Gully Holden and Bakers Delight for providing the gas BBQ and hundreds of bread rolls.

The Rotary Clubs in the Knox Cluster worked together in providing volunteers to man the entry gates at the Knox Festival over Saturday and Sunday of this community festival. President Mike did a lot of work in co-ordinating the volunteers from the five clubs into a workable roster. Our club support was strong with many members attending over long periods during the weekend. It was great to see the cluster doing something together and we hope this may continue. Our club will consider taking up a stand at next year's event as part of our community service.

The Ferntree Gully Volunteers Expo was again held in May. The Club stand was co-ordinated by Enid Hughes who secured rotary promotional display and material from District 9810. This Expo is to promote volunteering within the local Ferntree Gully community and is an excellent event to gain membership.

In order for the club to be involved in these community events we need the support of our members, and I would like to thank everyone for their support given throughout the year in our community involvement.

CCT (Cambodian Children's Trust)


Knox Tavern – our home for many years, had a fire in August last year and has been closed down ever since.






