


A special thank you to our clubs support team, District Governor Shia Smart, our Assistant Governor Christina Chia their support along with all District 9810 has been truly valuable.



COMMUNITY REPORT 2019-2020

Our approach to our local community projects was changed slightly this year, we wanted to Show Case what Rotary is all about, speak to local resident's and find out where we can assist in FTG.

We are working in partnership with support groups locally which will be ongoing

The Dandenong Ranges Winter Sleep Over, a program for homeless men sleeping rough.

FTG Community Support Program to advise people who need assistance with local services, meals etc. We gave a donation to the Foothills Community Church Christmas Lunch along with Christmas presents for MEN.

We again supported the Ferntree Gully CFA, not only with a donation, but we held a free sausage sizzle for about 130 local residents at the CFA's Bush Fire awareness information session.

The FTG Commonweath Bank approached us to assist in a sausage sizzle to raise monies for "Very Special Kids" Pink Pig Cancer campaign, members assisted and all funds raised went to the cause.

The Knox Toy Library whom our club has been supporting now for two years. we were able to assist in computer cataloguing the toys, also rebuilding existing shelving, and attending the opening of the upgraded Toy Library Center.

Interchange Disability Services in FTG we made a generous donation, for families to attend the annual camps run by volunteers enabling families to spend some much needed time away for a short break holiday.

Our Christmas Themed Free activity at the FTG Village Fair was once again received well by the participants making decorated salt dough Christmas decoraions. This year the weather was perfect and by far the best Fair Village in many years. The club also ran the BBQ so it was all hands on board.

We had another free activity at the Knox Festival held over two days. We show cased our Club with our gazebo displaying very large colourful pictures of our Rotary projects with the aim to attract new members. Children participated in decorating Easter themed salt dough shapes and judging by the smiles and reactions we received, a very well worth community project.

We were asked by Bunnings to participate in their Community Easter Family Evening where we were going to hold a free Easter themed craft stall for children, unfortunately this event was cancelled, however we donated 300 Easter Bunnies with a message from the Rotary Club of Fern Tree Gully, and these were distributed by Bunnings in show bags for the children to paint at home.

The District Governor's Partners program this year was "Books In the Home" Our contribution was directed to Fairhills primary school who would distribute books to children to keep at home.

We once again were able to secure a District Grant for Low Level Scholarships for students at Mountain District Learning Centre. Despite schools going to On Line schooling I have been assured the students will continue their studies.

Six members attended the Knox Council "Thank You" reception thanking us for volunteering in our local community.

INTERNATIONAL REPORT 2020-2019

Our projects this year were cut short by the arrival of the Coronavirus. Up to that time we donated \$3000.00 to the Taveuni Eye project. This project

gives sight to children and adults from the more remote and rural areas of Fiji. For just \$300.00 the project will restore the sight in both eyes for one Fijian.

We also donated \$3000.00 to Operation Toilets. This operation began when Rotarian Mark Balla who learned during a visit to India that many children did not attend school because there were no toilets, or the toilets that were there were so disgusting that they couldn't be used. To date this project has reached out to 30,000 children with projects over the next 18 months expected to lift this figure to well over 100,000.

Our further projects that we were going to donate to but did not present as we like to have a representative from the organisation attend our meeting and give us an update on the project, and present them with a cheque. These were:

Rotarians Against Malaria. We continue to support this project in honour of one of founding members Ken Thompson.

Operation Cleft. This project we continue to support in honour of the loving memory of Cass Bench, who contributed so much of her time and effort to the project.

As these two projects were budgeted for they must be honoured in the new Rotary year and I ask whoever is going to be responsible for International to make sure this is carried out.

Youth 2019/20

This (Rotary) year everything was going along "swimmingly", and then CORVID-19 struck. On 21 March 2020 District cancelled all youth programs till March 2021. Notwithstanding up to that date we still achieved a lot as outlined below.

FAIRHILLS HIGH

We continued our exciting relationship with Fairhills High School, focusing, (where appropriate), our Rotary Youth Programs upon them per below:

INTERACT

A school interact club of 14 to 18 year olds is sponsored by a Rotary club to work with the school to form, develop and support the club which involves itself in local community, develops skills, and make a difference locally and globally.

After holding elections for office bearers for the (school) year, the club held a member pin presentation to the 5 new students on the 8th of August 2019 with many Rotary members in attendance.

For an International project, the club chose to hold a Trivia night on the 13th of September 2020 where they raised just short of two thousand dollars for the school's upcoming Cambodia aid trip. The event was a great success and was subsequently published in the Knox news. Great publicity for the club and students.

For a Local Project they were tossing up between a bottle top recycling program or the "Solar Light Challenge" where they would assemble solar lights for communities in New Guinea.

In November 2020 we nominated Sam Heydon, our 1919 president, for Knox Council Junior Citizen of the Year; which he subsequently won and was presented with his award at an official function at Knox Council on Australia Day 2020. Congratulations Sam.

December 2019 heralded disappointment in the form of our host teacher, Susan Harris informing us she was leaving for another school. Being the trooper she is Susan arranged for a replacement, Karen Dean, one of Fairhills Assistant Principals. Karen subsequently took over the reins early 2020. Karen proved a great ambassador for the club and was supporting attendances at MUNA and an upcoming Interact Conference just out of Shepparton when COVID struck and everything stopped till further notice.

RYPEN (Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment).

Is a residential experience, where participants are involved in a variety of sessions, workshops and activities, which provide an opportunity for them to personally develop, challenge themselves, build friendships with like-minded people, and build life skills and / or awareness in areas such as leadership, working in a team, communication, goal setting, public speaking, contributing to the community, growing up in a digital world; and safe driving.

We already had one candidate and were in the process of selecting more for the RYPEN camp in September. And yes, we shut down due to the virus.

MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly).

Is a two day program which simulates sessions of the General Assembly of the United Nations. A team of two students is allocated a country to represent. They adopt that country's dress and represent their country in the Legislative Assembly Chamber of Parliament House.

This year (our third), we had selected two students from Fairhills High and had application forms ready to go when, once again everything ground to a halt.

RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Award)

Is an intensive six-day training program held at YMCA Lake Dewar Lodge, Myrniong, for young people aged 18 to 30. The program covers fundamentals and ethics of positive leadership, communication skills, problem-solving and conflict management, Rotary's purpose and service to the community, building self-confidence and self-esteem and elements of community and global citizenship.

Cancelled.

RJCA (Rotary Junior Community Award)

Is an exciting and innovative program initiated by the Rotary Club of Mitchell River which aims to assist children in the final year of primary school gain a more informed and balanced view of our community. It offers children the opportunity to develop personal skills that can be used both for themselves or shared more widely with community members or organizations. It introduces young people to a very necessary aspect of our communities – the work of the volunteer and can be thought of as a mini Duke of Edenborough Award.

This (school) year we had 22 students from Ferntree Gully North Primary and 6 from Fairhills Primary ready to go. In addition to this we had brought The Basin PS on board for the first time and were in the process of finalizing numbers, when, yes COVID struck and shut everything down.













FUNDRAISING 2019-2020

Until March 2020 like so many other things, fundraising had been going along very well. The lockdown however could not have come at a worse time for the club as it had both a midweek and a weekend sausage sizzle scheduled for the end of the month at Bunnings. Both of these events were cancelled. The result was a loss in excess of \$2000. There will be no more Bunnings sizzles in the near future. Having said this however the July 2019 to February 2020 period was very successful and has provided funds to help in many areas (most notably assisting in bushfire relief).

Rotary Foundation (Centurions)

The major activity again this year was gaining subscriptions to the Centurion Club (now called EREY – Every Rotarian Every Year) whereby Club members contributed A\$100 each over the Rotary year to support the great works of the Rotary Foundation, both in Australia and world-wide.
